1. Cost of dental materials
2. Cost of dental equipment
3. Cost of dental instruments
4. Cost of comprehensive and annual maintenance contracts (CMC/AMC)
5. Almost same cost of laboratory prosthetic work
6. Electrical appliances and branded furniture
7. Fee for accreditation of the clinical establishments

Variable cost determinants

1. Minimum labour wage for semi-skilled and skilled workforce (read receptionists, dental assistants, janitors etc) across various States and Union Territories
2. Electricity/water charges (commercial/residential)
3. Bio Medical Waste management and State/UTs pollution control board fee
4. Education and experience of oral health professionals
5. Other fees for procuring various licences as applicable in States and UTs
6. Rental values for residential and commercial spaces
